

Creative Writing

Overview

The creative writing program administered by the English department offers both classroom and extracurricular writing opportunities for English majors and nonmajors alike. Interested students may enroll in classes devoted to the study and practice of creative writing, publish their poetry and prose in the student literary magazine, and interact with some of the era's great writers who visit classes and give readings on campus.

Curriculum

Six creative writing courses are offered regularly. Introduction to Creative Writing is offered every semester and introduces students to principles and techniques across genres. Subsequent courses allow for concentrated work in Fiction Writing, Poetry Writing, Creative Nonfiction Writing, Literary Translation, and Selected Topics in Writing. Courses are open to English majors (who can fulfill up to two electives in the major) and to students in other majors.

English majors and students can also complete a minor in creative writing. The minor requires six courses. Courses such as playwriting, book making, and script analysis can be selected from other departments.

In each writing course, students turn in original work and receive extensive feedback from peers as well as from the instructor.

Faculty

The English faculty includes two full-time instructors of creative writing. Other members of the English faculty also contribute courses in creative writing.

Every two to three years, a Distinguished Writer in Residence joins the faculty for a semester. These have included poet and essayist Diane Ackerman; poets Angela Ball, Tomaž Šalamun, and Jennifer Moxley; novelists Josephine Humphreys, Colson Whitehead, and Christine Schutt; and Honor Moore, who writes in several genres.

Beyond the Coursework

Students interested in editing can join the staff of *The Messenger*, a campus literature and art magazine that solicits and selects from undergraduate submissions. Endowed cash prizes are awarded for each year's best pieces of poetry and prose.

The English department sponsors campus visits by prominent writers.
